Wildlife Research Permit Application – Mackenzie Bison Population Monitoring

Dear Mr. Armstrong:

As per section 12.5.1 of the Tłįchǫ Agreement, the Wek'èezhìı Renewable Resources Board (WRRB) considers the above-mentioned Wildlife Research Permit application as a management proposal. The Board understands that the objectives of the population monitoring program are to fulfil a key action of the *Mackenzie Bison Management Plan* by estimating abundance and monitoring herd composition, as well as monitoring for anthrax-related deaths and for brucellosis and tuberculosis in the population. Additionally, the Board understands that objectives of the use of drones are to determine if *Ejie* (bison) classification work can be conducted to obtain better data with less disturbance to the animals.

The proposed collaring deployment, scheduled from June 1, 2021 to December 31, 2025, occurring within the Mackenzie Bison Range, involves the following:

- A helicopter survey to find bison groups;
- Observers on the ground will use binoculars to classify ejie by age and sex;
- A DJI Mavic or Phantom 4 Pro drone (unmanned aerial system) may be used to take photos and video as well as determine whether classification for ejie can be done;
- A drone will only be used if ejie are found in a location away from buildings, people, and traffic that can be approached without disturbing them;
- Biweekly fixed-wing flights to look for ejie carcasses (suspected anthrax) from late June to mid-August annually;
- Monitoring for tuberculosis and brucellosis will be done opportunistically when cases are observed or reported to ENR; and
- Tissue samples may be collected from harvested ejie, ejie killed by motor vehicles or other dead ejie as opportunity presents.

The WRRB has taken a Level 1 review, as outlined in the Board's Rule for Management Proposals. The WRRB has no concerns with the project as presented in your application and looks forward to receiving results from the upcoming field season. If drones are used, the Board requests that detailed field notes are taken to inform future use of the technology on ejie.

The Board asks to be contacted if there is any opportunity for Board or staff involvement in your work. The WRRB requests that upon completion of each monitoring action an update will be provided to the Board.
