Re: Wildlife Research Permit application – Wolf Detection Survey and Kill Site Investigations

Dear Mrs. Clark,

As per section 12.5.1 of the Tłįchǫ Agreement, the Wek'èezhìı Renewable Resources Board (WRRB) considers the above-mentioned Wildlife Research Permit (WRP) application as a management proposal. The Board understands the objectives of the survey are to 1) build on the geospatial survey design conducted in 2021, 2) test the detection of wolves by surveying known wolf locations, 3) investigate cluster sites of collared wolves with the aim to help in the estimation of predation on barren-ground caribou, and 4) improve overall understanding of wolf association with barrenground caribou on their wintering ranges.

The WRRB understands the management proposal, planned for February 21 – April 30, 2022 near Wekweètì, to include the following:

Detection Survey

- Using collared wolves to assess observer detectability;
- Survey area flown by a small, fixed wing aircraft, transects will be flown with 1km spacing;
- Rear observers will be asked to locate the collared wolf by sight; and,
- All other wildlife and environmental conditions will be recorded.

Kill Site Investigation

- Using collared wolf locations to investigate potential kill/feeding sites;
- A small, fixed wing aircraft will fly to a cluster of repeated wolf collar locations;
- Co-ordinates will be circled a minimum of two to three times to assess if a carcass is present; and,
- Pictures and way points of carcasses will be taken and, if wolves are present, numbers will be recorded.

The WRRB has taken a Level 1 review, as outlined in the Board's Rule for Management Proposals. The WRRB has no concerns with the project as presented in your application. We encourage

community members with local Tłıcho knowledge to participate in the program whenever possible. The WRRB looks forward to receiving results from the upcoming field season.
